"Out of the Blue" By Don Wadley

This is a short teaser article on a jeep project that came in "out of the blue" so to speak. My son Ken got married this past year and along the way his wife expressed interest in working on rebuilding a jeep. They had been looking for a "project " jeep out in Georgia, having found nothing but seriously over priced rusted out hulks. They were getting pretty discouraged. She is pretty handy with tools, so I figured what the heck! I have a lot of residue from 40 years of jeep projects lying around that really needed cleaning up. So I started searching through my piles of stuff and what do you know I had 99 % of an M38A1 jeep lying around. Now lets be - clear all of the sheet metal will require quite a bit of repair and TLC and if anything were ever considered a "Parts Kit" this would be it. Nothing and I mean nothing was bolted together. So I offered the "kit" to her and she accepted. They are coming out this May/June ish time frame to pick it up.

Well Idle hands and all that. I figured they would have their hands full just fixing all the sheet metal, let alone building up a jeep from scratch. It would take them years and probably get discouraged along the way. So I went about building a jeep from parts. What else have i got to do. I restored only those parts that would be unsafe and unreliable; brakes, steering, axles, powerpack. So that the jeep could be safely driven nomatter what it looked like. They could then work on what area they wanted first and incrementally work their way through the entire restoration. Along the way anytime they got tired of working on it, just take it out for a drive.

I started with a frame and added axles, tub, steering column etc. Basically building a rolling chassis with brakes and steering that worked. Then went about building a power-pack up from a casting. After that added a minimal wiring harness and seats. It needs a ton of body work and lot of paint but is basically a very straight tub and fenders on a reliable safe power train. I have probably more than 300 hours into it—NOW IT'S THEIR TURN!!!. As they make progress I'll have the pictures here in the newsletter.

The attached pictures show the highlights of the project culminating in her driving here in Boise back in December. Everything that would be on a M38A1 with the exception of a spare tire holder is on her jeep. It just needs a lot of TLC to make it presentable. I want to thank all of you that contributed parts to my jeep parts pile over the years. This project wouldn't have been possible without you.




