Three years ago I got frustrated with the Idaho Transportation Department. They had asked me to try to get as many old military vehicles titled as possible. We developed a very smooth streamlined method of doing the titling and all went well until midstream they changed their mind and decided I needed to do the paperwork completely different.

I was so flustered with them I just gave up for three years. Since things have

been slow at work I decided they weren't going to change to I'd better figure it out. I think I did figure it out after a couple of headaches and I've done 11 titles with the new method and they seem to be going through and we are seeing clean branded titles come through.

The branded title is not a bad thing. The vehicle can still be sold to anyone. It just means that if someone claims ownership of the vehicle they can be given a hearing in 48 hours to determine if they have a legitimate claim to the vehicle. After three years this brand is gone.

If you have a vehicle that is not titled you can't legally sell it in Idaho. It is a crime to sell any motor vehicle that is not titled.

For a fee I can take care of all the paperwork and get you a clean title. If you are a club member just contact me and I'll walk you through the process. That \$20 per year membership can really pay off.

I bought a derelict GPW from IMVPA member Mike B about 4 years ago and last summer I started the restoration on it. I figured I could work on it all winter and be done by spring but the fact is without a heated place to work it was just too painful. This winter we put heat in the shop, which you can read about in a prior article, but that's not what this is about.

Since the weather warmed up the restoration has accelerated wildly but it's still not done. Quite frankly if it weren't for the assistance I've gotten from friends who are IMVPA members this jeep would still be sitting on a shelf. Al stopped by to help me get it started for the first time. Mike P has been great, showing me how to change the engine timing chain. Benjamin has been over in his free time to assist with the rebuild of the axles and some of the wiring. Our own VP Matt has helped in a dozen different ways. Don W was isolating due to the pandemic but for some reason he always answers his phone when I call with a super basic question. Roy did some stud extraction in his machine shop and we were able to save one of the knuckles. Bob S dedicated way too much time talking to me on the phone about body work and paint. "The Windshield Guy" in Boise added the glass to the frame and he did a great job. He was about 1/3 less than anyone else and the price was right. On this frame I

added a rifle bracket kit even though the early jeeps didn't come with one. Blasphemy! Yeah well I think the more guns the better. There I said it.



You might notice the M48 machine gun mount. That was found at the Fruitland show a few years ago. It's still missing some of its bits but it sure felt good to add it. I shot this GPW with some Gillespie Coatings primer and 33070 olive drab paint. For right or for wrong I always liked this particular color and I guess that's what it really comes down to. This GPW had its original data plates and it hurt to take them off, but the M48 mount already had a ½ glove box door, so on go some repro data plates and a quick stamping using Matt's stamp set. Is it horrible to take off sweet looking original data plates and add repros? Yes I suppose so but what do you want worse, original pates or more machine guns? Don't answer that!

Whoa, is that a tailgate? No, the body of this GPW was okay good for its age but the back panel was really rusty and wavy.
